

Camel

- There are two kinds of camels: the dromedary, with one hump, and the Bactrian, with two humps.
- Some people think camels store water in their humps, but it's actually fat! The fat gives them energy when food and water are not around.
- A camel weighs about two times as much as a tiger.

Alpaca & Llama

- Alpacas and Ilamas are part of the camel family. People like them for their wool. Alpaca wool is like real hair. Llama wool is like fleece.
- Sometimes, they can be shy. But, watch out if they get annoyed they tend to spit!
- Alpacas weigh less than 200 pounds. Llamas weigh half as much as tigers.


Hello from...South America!

Guanaco

- Guanacos are related to the camel, alpaca and llama, among others. All belong to the camelid family.
- They have very soft wool, with a second layer of coarse hair called 'quard hair.'
- A group of guanacos are called a herd, which is composed of females, their young, and one dominant male.
- A baby Guanaco is called a chulengo, and it is able to walk immediately after birth.







- They get around by hopping on their strong back legs.
- They can jump 15 feet in a single bound.
- Kangaroos have a large muscular tail that serves as a '5th leg.'
- They are herbivores, and they regurgitate to re-chew their food.
- A group of kangaroos is called a 'mob.'





Whiteface Clown

- face is mostly white
- appears more intelligent
- dresses neatly



Character Clown

- wears a costume suited for a job, hobby or lifestyle
- paints his/her face in any style

A stroll down clown alley

Clown alley is the area where clowns get dressed. It is for clowns only. Here is what clowns need to get ready for show time:

greasepaint, or makeup

Each Ringling Bros. clown uses more than 2 pounds of greasepaint each year!

shoes

Clown shoes have an oversized outer shoe and an inner shoe that fits the clown's foot.

wig

These are customfitted and usually made from yak hair.

nose

Most clowns wear rubber noses.

agent suit

This is a clown's best personal costume.





Time to Clown Around!









Build Your Own Circus Train!

Are You Fit for the Circus?


Play the team CircusFit® game!

Your goal is to become one of the members of team **CircusFit** by moving through the maze to reach the *Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey®* Circus arena.


There are two ways to move around the board:

- do a somersault (on something soft, such as a rug or a mat)







Create Your Own Circus!

Teacher/Leader:

- Your class is going to create its own circus!
- This is something you can do for fun with just your classroom group or maybe something you can put on for your parents or other groups.
- There are multiple acts in a circus show. To get the full circus effect, we suggest that you do as many acts as you can!
- First: Select the people who wish to be the performer(s) for each act in your circus.
- Second: Have the performers for each act get together for 10-20 minutes to imagine their circus act, develop their individual roles and practice their parts. Each circus act can be 2-5 minutes long.
- After all the circus act teams are ready, bring them back, and let's start the show.



Create Your Own Circus!

Ringmaster:

• Every show needs a Ringmaster. They are your master of ceremonies! They provide an introduction to your circus, introduce each act and end the show!

Band:

 Every show also needs a band of musicians to do the drum rolls and make funny noises as each circus act is introduced throughout the show. Use whatever you have available to make some noise before the start of each circus act... whistles, pots, pans or upside-down buckets!

Lions and Animal Trainer:

 No circus would be complete without several large, powerful lions or tigers and one brave animal trainer who directs these cats through their routine!

Ushers:

 It is important to have people that greet your guests, help them find their seats and make sure everyone is happy!

Clowns:

 Of course, it wouldn't be a circus without the clowns! Juggling, jokes, gags and more!

Magic Show:

• Is there a magician in your class? We definitely could use one of these sleight-ofhand artists in your circus!

Contortionist:

Who are the flexible contortionists in the group?

Acrobats:

Is there a gymnast in the class who can show off their tumbling skills?

High-wire Act:









HOW TO DRAW AN ELEPHANT!

Meet the Elephants • • •

nce there were millions of elephants roaming the land that is now Asia. Now, there are fewer than 35,000 of these Asian elephants alive. The Asian elephant is endangered. If something is not done, the species could die off.

The Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Center for Elephant Conservation® was built just to help these majestic animals. Since 1995, elephants have lived on 200 acres of land in Florida. They live, play and eat there. Twenty-six baby elephants have been born there!






Fun Facts

- The small tusks sometimes found on female elephants are called TUSHES!
- Elephant moms are pregnant for 22 months. That's ALMOST TWO YEARS!
- The elephants at the *Ringling Bros. Center for Elephant Conservation* each eat 150-200 pounds of grain, fruit and vegetables per day.
- One elephant uses up to 80 gallons of water daily for drinking and bathing.
- Baby elephants walk within hours after they are born.
- The male Asian elephants use their ivory tusks to dig and to uproot trees.






The Elephant's Trusty Trunk

An elephant can breathe through two nostrils at the end of his or her trunk. The trunk is also used to get water and food. To get water, the elephant sucks water into the trunk, then curls the trunk towards the mouth and squirts the water into it. The trunk of an Asian elephant has one upper finger, which it uses like a scoop.



Elephants are also called pachyderms (pack e derms). The word pachyderm means "thickskinned" in Greek. The skin on an elephant's head and back is one to two inches thick. It is thinner on other parts of its body. This thick skin helps protect them from the sun. A baby elephant, called a calf, loves to play in water and mud. The mud bath helps to keep its skin healthy.


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
